The papers of Arthur A. Kimball were deposited in the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library by his widow Mrs. Betty Kimball in November 1997.

Mrs. Kimball signed an instrument of gift for the papers on November 10, 1997. Literary rights in the unpublished writings of Arthur A. Kimball in this collection and in all other collections of papers received by the United States have been donated to the public. Under terms of the instrument of gift, the following classes of items are withheld from research use:

1. Papers which constitute an invasion of personal privacy or a libel of a living person.
2. Papers which are required to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and are properly classified.

## SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

Arthur Alden Kimball (1908-1996) was born in Washington, DC. His father Arthur H. Kimball was a prominent ophthalmologist. His grandfather Ivory G. Kimball was a Civil War veteran who was appointed judge of the Washington, DC, police court by President Cleveland in 1893. Kimball entered government service in 1928 when he went to work for the Commerce Department. Over the next several years he worked for the National Recovery Administration and the Social Security Board. At the start of World War II he joined the army and became a budget officer in the War Department. He later served as Chief of Administration for the U.S. prosecution team at the Nazi war crimes trials in Nurnberg, Germany.

After the war Kimball worked in the State Department and helped George Marshall establish the Economic Cooperation Administration for administering the Marshall Plan. Kimball later served as head of the International Information Administration, a branch of the State Department. When the IIA became a separate agency, the U.S. Information Agency, in 1953, President Eisenhower allowed Kimball to serve as acting director until the first full-time director, Theodore Streibert, could take office. Kimball then joined the White House staff as staff director of the President's Advisory Committee on Government Organization (PACGO). He assisted the committee chairmen, Nelson Rockefeller and Arthur Flemming, and managed the work of the committee's professional staff. In November 1960 President Eisenhower appointed Kimball to the National Labor Relations Board. The Senate did not confirm the appointment and Kimball left government service after John F. Kennedy became president. He practiced law in Washington, DC, for 5 years, and then returned to government service in 1966. He worked for the Social Security Administration and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. From 1972 to 1974 he was Director of International Training at the Agency for International Development. In December 1974 he retired and moved to Florida where he became alumni officer at the Florida Institute of Technology.

The papers of Arthur Kimball pertain mostly to his military service and his work with PACGO. The material on his military service includes his personal 201 file and photographs, memorabilia and printed material relating to the war crimes trials at Nurnberg, Germany, in 1946. The PACGO material contains copies of reports and recommendations on government organization compiled by the Committee. These are largely duplicate copies of the official committee records at the Eisenhower Library. The collection also contains a small quantity of material on his work for the Agency for International Development (AID) from 1972 to 1974.

The remainder of the collection consists mostly of routine social correspondence. Kimball's letters to his mother during the 1930s contain information on his trips, his social activities, and his efforts to support his family during the Great Depression. However, there are very few comments on his work for the National Recovery Administration or the Social Security Board. Kimball's correspondence with the George Marshall Research Foundation contain retrospective comments on his work with George Marshall while Marshall was Secretary of State, and the development of the Marshall Plan. The collection also contains some social correspondence of Kimball's father Arthur H. Kimball, and newspaper clippings on the work of his grandfather Ivory Kimball while serving as a police judge in Washington, DC, from 1891 to 1903.
